RELIEF DISTRIBUTION

1. During 2024-2025, a total of six villages which are located in the hilly regions of the state, were affected by the monsoon rain and torrential winds. 6 houses were destroyed by the strong winds and hailstorm also followed by flood due to the heavy monsoon rain. Immediate Financial Assistance were given to the victims for their rehabilitation and to meet their essential needs during their difficult times.

Details of the Affected Areas are given below..

1. One house in L Mollen, Henglep Sub division-affected by hailstorms.
2. Two houses in Thangsi Village, Henglep Area were also affected by strong winds.
3. One house in Konakpur, Cachar, Assam –also affected by strong winds.
4. A house in K Thenjang, Leimata Area, due to monsoon rains and strong winds.
5. A house in Kholmunnom, Tuilangkol Area was also destroyed by storm.
6. Joulen, Tuibong Block- the whole village was flooded.

2. Distribution of Relief Materials to IDPs Students.

Following the outbreak of the ethnic conflict between the Meitei and Kuki communities in Manipur, thousands of families were forcibly displaced from their homes, leaving many children deprived of access to education and basic necessities. In response to this humanitarian crisis, the kuki students organisation (KSO), a philanthropic Organisation, established a community school at Tuibong to provide educational support and stability for displaced students.

A total of 300 internally Displaced Persons (IDP) students were enrolled in the school. To alleviate their hardships and ensure their well-being, essential relief materials were distributed to all students, including nutritional supplements, school uniforms, textbooks, and blankets. This initiatives aimed not only to meet their immediate needs but also to restore dignity, hope and a sense of normalcy in the lives of children severely affected by the violence and displacement.

SKILLS TRAINING AND OTHER ACTIVITIES.

1. TAILORING TRAINING:

A six-month intensive tailoring training programme on basic tailoring and garment-making skills was successfully conducted from September- February. The programme was organised with the objective of empowering individuals, particularly women and youth, through vocational skill development and sustainable livelihood opportunities.

A total of 15 candidates actively participated in the training under the guidance and supervision of Mrs Lamneihoi of Boljang, who served as the instructor and mentor throughout the course. The trainees were equipped with practical knowledge and hands-on experience in cutting, stitching, designing, and basic garment production.

Upon successful completion of the programme, certificate were awarded to all participants in recognition of their dedication and achievement. The training proved to be highly successful, enhancing the confidence, self-reliance, and income-generating potential of the trainees while encouraging them towards economic independence and entrepreneurship.

2. **ELECTRICAL WIRING TRAINING.**

A three-month basic electrical wiring training programme for residential houses was successfully conducted from June to August 2024 with the objective of equipping unemployed youth with practical technical skills and enhancing their livelihood opportunities.

A total of 30 trainees actively participated in the programme, all of whom demonstrated commitment and enthusiasm throughout the training period. The course provided intensive hands-on training in household electrical wiring, installation, maintenance, safety measures and basic troubleshooting techniques, enabling the participants to acquire practical knowledge essential for employment and self-reliance.

Upon successful completion of the training, course completion certificates were awarded to all trainees in recognition of their dedication and achievement. The programme concluded successfully with a closing ceremony attended by trainers, participants, and community members. The training proved to be highly impactful in strengthening the technical capacity, confidence, and employment potential of the trainees, while also encouraging skill-based entrepreneurship and economic independence within community



OTHER ACTIVITIES.

1. CAPACITY BUILDING

In collaboration with Rural Aid Service (RAS), a comprehensive One Day workshop on organisation Capacity Building and Business Development Planning was successfully conducted at the Conference Hall of the ECA Administrative office. The workshop served as a strategic platform aimed at strengthening institutional leadership, enhancing organisational sustainability, and equipping local leaders with practical knowledge and innovative approaches for community development and effective governance. The programme witnessed the active participation of more than 30 attendees, including community leaders, youth representatives and local leaders from various areas. The workshop fostered meaningful discussions, knowledge-sharing and capacity enhancement to empower participants in addressing developmental challenges and promoting sustainable growth within their respective communities.

The resource persons delivered insightful sessions on organisational strengthening, leadership development, strategic planning, entrepreneurship, financial sustainability, and community-driven development initiatives. Their expertise and guidance significantly enriched the learning experience of the participants and inspired greater commitment towards grassroots transformation and self-reliance.

2 . FREE MEDICAL CAMP

In response to the humanitarian crisis arising from the Manipur violence, two free Medical violence two Free Medical Camps were successfully organised to provide urgent healthcare assistance to Internally Displace Persons (IDPs) and vulnerable families residing in relief camps and buffer zone areas. These medical outreach initiatives were undertaken with the objective of addressing the immediate health needs of conflict-affected communities who were facing severe hardship, displacement, and limited access to basic medical services.

- a. A large-scale Free Medical Camp was organised at the Sangai University Relief Camp on 28th July 2024, where more than 300 IDPs received medical assistance and treatment. The camp was attended by a team of 8 dedicated doctors and healthcare professionals who voluntarily rendered their services for the welfare of the displaced population. Free medical consultations, health check-ups, medicines, and essential healthcare support were provided without any charges, ensuring that the affected individuals, including women, children and the elderly received timely and compassionate care during a period of crisis and uncertainty.
- b. Another Free Medical Camp was conducted at Changpikot, Specifically targeting families and individuals residing in the buffer zone areas who continued to face immense challenges due to the on going conflict situation. More than 150 patients benefited from the camp through free diagnosis, treatment, distribution of medicines and health awareness support.

These humanitarian interventions reflected the organisation's unwavering commitment towards serving conflict-affected communities, safeguarding public health, and extending compassionate support to vulnerable populations during one of the most challenging periods faced by the people of Manipur
